In February, 2024, UUSJ launched a new program to help mobilize our UU congregations in their work to save our democracy.

Our democracy is in peril, and this impacts all of our social justice work. In response to this fact, our Democracy Action Team launched a monthly convening of UU Democracy Leaders in an ongoing discussion about how we can can contribute to a pro-democracy movement capable of thwarting the autocratic movement emerging in the U.S.

This program helps us join forces and work together towards a common goal by sharing and spreading best practices in building the movement we need in this moment.



UUSJ launched a new program, asking congregations to help leverage our collective power at the federal level as a people of faith.

We observed, so many of us feel our democracy is in danger, and feel powerless. But we are not powerless; we all have meaningful ways to save our democratic system.

One way is to commit to being an active part of civil society, which means committing to our institutions. This includes our home churches and UUSJ as the forward-facing UU organization advocating for our values on Capitol Hill and Washington D.C. with federal decision-makers.

UUs Gather for Climate Advocacy in DC

In September, 2023, Unitarian Universalists came together in Washington, DC, to advocate for systemic changes in addressing the climate crisis. We used the farm bill as a vehicle for our advocacy conversations. We learned how farming and ranching can provide essential opportunities in addressing the climate crisis if we get the incentives and program structures to work in favor of what we want. We asked for conservation and climate-smart agriculture as well as equitable USDA programs.

We heard from experts in the field **Scott Faber**, Environmental Working Group; **Lloyd Wright**, United States Department of Agriculture (retired); **Joe Van Wye**, Farm Action; **Karyn Bigelow**, Creation Justice Ministries; and **Madison Mayhew**, Interfaith Power & Light.















We held a **Climate Friendly Farm Bill Worship Service** featuring Rev. "CT," Carol Thomas Cissel, UU Congregation of Arlington, Virginia and hosted by Rev. Kelly Dignan of UU Ministry for Earth (UUMFE).

For our day of advocacy, we were briefed by **Representative Chellie Pingree** (D-ME) at the U.S. Capitol Visitors center before UU constituents met with their Senate offices, Democrats and Republicans, many on the Senate Agriculture Committee, to advocate for a better, climate-smart, regenerative approach to the farm bill.

UUMFE movement chaplains helped put front and center our progressive faith-based values and principles in our conversations. As UUSJ advocates, we communicated our deep concern for the interdependent web of life. We shared our desire to see farmers offered the tools and programs needed to become partners in addressing the climate crisis. We shared that we see no division between people and the planet. **UUs for a Just Economic Community** convened this conference in partnership with UUMFE and UUSJ and with the kind support of **Side With Love** and the **UU Funding Program**.







Public Comments

When the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) considered a historic new rule that would establish a minimum staffing standard in nursing homes for the first time, we mobilized for public comments on this proposed rule. For us it was a matter of economic justice and good health industry policy.

As the country pivoted to a consequential election, political forces ramped up use of immigration issues to stir up their base voters rather than passing legislation to solve important challenges. While most helpful legislation was stalled, certain issues were being approached through administrative actions—some to good effect, others less so.

We made public comments in support of immigrants.





We opposed a proposal to allow asylum officers to consider "bars" to asylum during fear screenings. We felt this would make the asylum process more arbitrary and complex than it currently is. We defended a fair system.

We came out in support of a rule automatically extending the Employment Authorization

Documents (EAD) period for certain renewal applicants from 180 days to 540 days or longer. Complicated work authorization rules make it hard for migrants, to obtain jobs to support their families (and help build our economy). Whether they are Afghan ally refugees, asylum seekers, Dreamers, or others, we care!





Brief History of UUSJ

In 1998 Jack Edmondson, Executive Director of Open Door Housing, a UU organization, asked UUA President Rev. John Buehrens to explore the formation in DC of a coalition similar to the historic Urban Ministry in Boston.

After initial discussions, Rev. Buehrens embraced the idea and funded an organizer and consultant, Bob Johnsen, to develop the vision. Bob is a UU.

They were animated by the idea of "a loud, unified voice on public policy issues" with an eye for activism.


